"Where do I even begin? What are some realistic onramps for engaging with people on the margins?"

- + Our church already has valuable **friendships** with friends on the margins some who follow Jesus and some who don't, some who are housed and some who aren't, some who are comfortable with "church" and some who aren't. Get to know them! Chat with them at a gathering, invite them over for a meal or a shower, ask them about their journey, share about your own struggles, and expect God to humble you as you walk with them!
- + Engaging in short-term ways : Although longerterm relationships are ideal, don't be afraid to listen to how the Spirit might be inviting us to acknowledge people on the margins in onetime interactions. Our friends on the street consistently note that smiles and seeminglysmall acknowledgements of people's existence go a long way in breaking down feelings and lived-realities of invisibility, worthlessness, and shame. We're all beautiful image-bearers of our Creator! Also, come prepared - what if we starting carrying a granola bar, a pair of socks, and a food gift card with us every day and expected to give them away? Might God be inviting us out of our mind & heart-sets of scarcity & self-protection and into trust of His immeasurably-more provision and faithfulness
- + Discipleship friendships: We're currently praying about how individuals in our church can partner with local organizations in order to be advocates for and friends with people on the margins. These relationships will look different from person to person, but will be based in friendship and discipleship. Stay tuned for more discussion & info about engaging in this way soon and ask God to show how He might be inviting you into these relationships.
